Gale Warning for Tuesday for Byron Coast

WINDS: West to southwesterly 20 to 30 knots, reaching up to 45 knots during the afternoon and evening. Winds turning southerly 25 to 30 knots in the evening.

SEAS: 2 to 3 metres, increasing to 3 to 5 metres by early evening.

SWELL: Southerly 1 to 1.5 metres, increasing to 2 to 3 metres by early evening.
